#### From Booklist

The public is learning more about genetics than ever before—witness recent news stories about analyzing one's genome to predict the possibility of genetic disease, for example—and there is a real need for accurate, accessible information about these conditions. This new encyclopedia from Greenwood provides a good overview of the subject. The author, a professor of educational leadership and a medical writer, begins with three overview essays that explain basic genetics, proteomics, and the human genome. The main body of the work has 18 long entries on special topics (Aging and genetics, Embryology, Genetic counseling) and 355 shorter entries covering individual genetic diseases and diseases that have genetic components. Entries are arranged alphabetically, with appropriate see also references (important, since many of these conditions have more than one name). The entries for diseases include the prevalence of the disorder, other names of the condition, information about its discovery, a definition, the genetic cause, treatment, and sources for further reading. The author notes that these diseases usually have no cure, so the treatment information covers symptomatic relief. Black-and-white photographs and diagrams supplement the text, and many entries offer fact boxes with information about the discoverer of the disease or a person who has it. A resource list and an index complete the work. The reading level is high school and above. The author acknowledges the usefulness of the Genetics Home Reference website(http://ghr.nlm.nih.gov) and libraries will do well to bookmark that site for more information. This is an excellent resource for school, public, and consumerhealth libraries, offering a very accessible presentation of complex material. --Barbara Bibel
